# Draft Surrey Sustainable Community Strategy 2008 Waverley Context, link to Corporate Plan priorities and response to consultation

## General comments - Waverley's response:

- Waverley has already endorsed the draft Surrey Sustainable Community Strategy, and the Waverley Strategic Partnership has agreed to adopt the themes of the Surrey SCS as the basis for the new Waverley SCS, rather than rewriting Waverley's themes.
- Waverley would welcome more references and linkages to local Sustainable Community Strategies and the Local Strategic Partnerships throughout the Strategy.
- The Strategy is clear and easy to understand, with specific areas of action. It is important that each of the priorities and actions have 'SMART' targets and milestones, with clear lead accountabilities so that partners understand what is expected of them and the outcomes can be measured and monitored. It is also important to ensure, wherever possible, that data used to monitor data the SCS and LAA is available at District/Borough or community level so that individual partners and local and thematic partnerships can target resources and improve performance in the necessary areas.
- In light of the current economic downturn, there should be more emphasis throughout the strategy on the partnership's role in supporting residents and businesses through the recession, whilst acknowledging that the partnership also needs to set itself challenging targets to prepare for an expected economic up-turn following the recession.

# Waverley's Response:

• An issue that is highlighted as part of Waverley's Social Inclusion Strategy 2008 relating to youth is difficulties experienced by young people accessing services and entertainment. This could be a significant barrier to achieving this priority. This is particularly relevant in Waverley, which is the most rural Borough in Surrey. Reference should be made in the SCS to providing affordable, accessible transport for young people and providing services and facilities locally for young people.

## Waverley's response:

- We support reduction of inequalities as a target. This is particularly relevant in Waverley where outward appearance of
  affluence can conceal some pockets of disadvantage and deprivation and partnership working can be particularly effective
  when resources are targeted into specific communities. Some smaller pockets of deprivation may be masked if data is
  considered at Ward level where possible inequalities should be considered at community level for example using Super
  Output Area data.
- The role that leisure can play in improving health outcomes should be emphasised, and the role of the partnership in encouraging exercise, walking and cycling instead of using the car, fitness and sport, and providing affordable and accessible leisure facilities.
- A major issue which should be included as a priority area for action in the Strategy is improving access to services outside the home, as well as those provided within the home. This is particularly important in a rural area like Waverley with high

proportion of elderly people. Priorities should be the provision of adequate, accessible and affordable public and community transport and providing, where possible services, locally.

## Waverley's Response:

- In light of the current economic downturn, there should be more emphasis throughout the strategy on the partnership's role in supporting residents and businesses through the recession, whilst acknowledging that the partnership also needs to set itself challenging long term targets to prepare for an expected economic up-turn following the recession. In the long term it is appropriate to set a headline target to reduce the number of people claiming key out-of-work benefits, by promoting skills, education, training and employment opportunities. However, in light of the recession and potential rise in job losses and unemployment, in the short term it is more appropriate to encourage residents to access all the benefits that are available to them, for example through Waverley's 'Don't lose your Home or Business project'.
- Reference should be made to the challenges facing many businesses, and there should be a role for the partnership to help maintain existing businesses and sectors during the recession, and equip businesses to survive the downturn.
- Reference should also be made to promoting and maintaining Market Town economies as service centres, as well as major 'hubs' and rural economies.

#### Waverley's response:

- The SSP partners should lead by example on sustainability issues, by taking steps to reduce their own CO<sub>2</sub> and other harmful emissions as part of the actions going forward, as well as promoting initiatives to reduce emissions of residents and businesses in Surrey.
- Whilst acknowledging that it is mainly the function of District and Borough Councils the provision of subsidised affordable housing should be given much more prominence and priority within this theme, as one of the biggest challenges in Waverley and across the whole of Surrey.
- The importance of providing sustainable and timely infrastructure to support any new development should be emphasised. The link between the Surrey Sustainable Community Strategy and Local Development Frameworks across Surrey should be promoted.

#### Waverley's response:

- The Strategy should emphasise that the Partnership should seek to maintain and improve Surrey's position as an area of **actual** low crime as well as focusing on improving public confidence.
- We do not agree that NI6 is a good measure of 'stronger communities', although we acknowledge the difficulty in selecting an appropriate indicator. We feel that a good emphasis under this theme is empowering communities, therefore suggest that NI4 (% of residents who feel they can influence decisions in their local area) is a better (although not ideal) measure.
- Recent positive examples of partnership working in communities in Waverley include targeting resources in deprived or disadvantaged areas such as Sandy Hill in Farnham, Ockford Ridge in Godalming and Northbourne in Farncombe and action plans following recent Market Town Healthchecks in Cranleigh, Godalming and Haslemere. We feel that partnership

working can add most value when targeted at specific areas or communities of need on a small scale, and also empower communities to do more themselves. Good practice examples from across Surrey should be sought, lessons learned and shared. This section should include reference to targeting partnership working at areas of most need, for example using the recent 'Heat mapping' tool developed by the Safer and Stronger Board. Partners should also give attention to the findings of Parish Plans and Market Town Healthchecks and support their development. Although not all of Surrey is covered by Town and Parish Councils, they should be mentioned in this section as a key link to local communities.

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
