Title:

APPLICATION FOR STREET TRADING CONSENT - HIGH STREET, CRANLEIGH

[Wards Affected: Cranleigh West]

Summary and purpose:

Waverley Borough Council is the Licensing Authority under the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1982, and the purpose of this report is to determine an application for a licence to trade in a designated 'consent' street.

How this report relates to the Council's Corporate Priorities:

Street trading controls relate to the Council's Corporate Priority of **Environment** - Protecting and enhancing Waverley's unique mix of rural and urban communities

Financial Implications:

Traders wishing to operate within a Consent Street are liable for an annual charge. This is currently set at £280 per year.

Legal Implications:

The Council is under no duty to grant consent to trade on a street that has been designated as a Consent Street. There is no right of appeal against the refusal of consent or the application of conditions attached to a Consent. However, the Human Rights of the applicant could be affected if they do not receive a fair hearing. Under Human Rights legislation, the existing Consent is considered a possession and should not be revoked without good reason. The Council must act reasonably in making a decision taking into account the legislation.

Background

- Street Trading is defined as the selling or exposing or offering for sale of any article (or living thing) in a street. Such activity may cause nuisance and may be controlled by local authorities.
- 2. In 1992, Waverley Borough Council adopted powers under the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1982, to control street trading by the designation of 'prohibited', 'licence' and 'consent' streets.

A 'Prohibited' street means a street in which street trading is prohibited; A 'Consent' street means a street in which street trading is prohibited unless the Council has given consent.

- A 'Licence' street means a street in which street trading is prohibited without a licence granted by the Council.
- 3. A street which is designated as a Consent Street covers trading, for example, by mobile food vans trading on streets or in an official lay-by. The Council is under no duty to grant consent to trade on a street that has been designated as a Consent Street. There is no right of appeal against the refusal of consent, or the application of conditions attached to a Consent, contained in the 1982 Act.
- 4. Consents to operate in Waverley Borough Council are currently chargeable at £280 per year. The Council may attach such conditions to a Consent as it considers reasonably necessary. Such conditions can include requirements that would help prevent the obstruction of the street or danger to persons using it; or nuisance or annoyance, whether to persons using the street or otherwise. In addition, the conditions can specify where the holder of the consent can trade and also at what times he or she may do so. The Council has a policy for determining such applications. The relevant Head of Service may grant the application unless it is subject to objections.
- 5. Street trading controls apply to the High Street in Cranleigh in its entirety as a designated consent street. A copy of the Council's list of prohibited and consent streets is included with this report as <u>Annexe 1</u>.
- 6. On 19 June 2017 an application for a Street Trading Consent (applicant Andrey Andreev) was heard by the Licensing and Regulatory Committee of Waverley Borough Council due to seven (7) valid objections being received to the application.
- 7. It was the decision of the Committee to permit a 6 month consent to the applicant to trade in Cranleigh High Street. The consent was issued on 30 June 2017 and will expire on 30 December 2017. A copy of the consent is included with this report as Annexe 2.
- 8. A valid application dated 17 November 2017 (hand delivered to the Council Offices on the same date) has been received from Mr Andrey Andreev to renew his consent to trade as 'Kebab Burger Van' in Cranleigh High Street (outside 41 High Street-The Post Office). A copy of the application form is included as Annexe 3 to this report. The applicant has applied to trade 7 days a week between 1730hrs and 2300hrs at this location.
- A 28 day consultation period, as required under the Council's Street Trading policy was started on 17 November 2017. This consultation period will close on 16 December 2017.
- 10. Your officers have consulted Cranleigh Parish Council, Cranleigh Councillors, Cranleigh Chamber of Commerce, Waverley Borough Council's Planning Department, Surrey Police, Surrey Fire and Rescue Service, Surrey County Council Highways Authority and other relevant consultees as part of the consultation period.
- 11. In total one (1) objection has been received to the application at the time of writing this report (6 December 2017). This objection has been included as an attachment to this report as Annexe 4

- 12. Matters which have been highlighted as concerns include increased littering, concerns of anti-social behaviour (Public Order and Public Nuisance), that there is sufficient current provision within the local area (Needs of the area) and that this is not in-keeping with the area.
- 13. Since the issuing of the 6 month consent, some complaints have been received by Environmental Health of littering around the area of this street trader. These complaints have been highlighted to the applicant who has advised that they will increase their litter picking in the area. These complaints are being monitored.
- 14. No statements of support have been received.
- 15. If further objections or statements of support are received prior to the Committee date, these will be made available.

Recommendation

That the Licensing and Regulatory Committee determine the application from Mr Andrey Andreev for a consent to trade outside 41 High Street, Cranleigh.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT (MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS) ACT 1982 Street Trading Consent

Waverley Borough Council, being the Licensing Authority under Section 3 of the above Act, hereby grant consent, to:

to carry out street trading at the address below:

- Outside Post Office, High Street, Cranleigh, Surrey on a seven-day a week operation
- Trading in food items Kebabs, burgers, chips etc.
- Hours between 19:00 22:00 Monday to Friday and 17:30 22:00 Saturday and Sunday.

This consent is granted subject to the Council's standard conditions as set out in the 'Street Trading in Waverley Policy' and listed below in Schedule 1.

This Consent shall continue from the date hereof until 30th December 2017 unless previously revoked or surrendered.

Schedule 1

- 1. 'Consent Street' means a street in which street trading is prohibited without a Consent from Waverley Borough Council
- 'Prohibited Street' means a street in which street trading is prohibited at all times
- 3. 'Street' includes any road, footway, lay-by or other open area to which the public have access without payment
- 4. 'Street Trading' means (generally) the selling, or exposing or offering for sale, any article in a street
- 5. The trader shall not cause any obstruction of the street or any danger to any persons or vehicles using the street
- 6. The trader shall not cause any nuisance or annoyance to any other person, whether that person is using the street or otherwise, or to the occupier of any building in proximity to the consent site
- 7. The council may at any time vary the conditions of a street trading consent or revoke at any time
- Public liability insurance providing cover to a minimum amount of 5
 million pounds must be in place for the consent site and a certificate of
 this must be produced on request of an officer of Waverley Borough
 Council
- An individual trader shall conspicuously display the council issued Consent at all times whilst trading; for special events, the Consent will be displayed in at least two conspicuous places – typically these shall be attached to the first and last stalls
- 10. The Consent holder must provide facilities for use by him/herself and customers to collect any waste, refuse or litter. The refuse storage must be of a substantial construction, waterproof and animal-proof. All must be removed from the trading location at the end of each day's trading and properly disposed of, or if the amount of waste and refuse warrants it, when the container is full whichever is the sooner.
- 11. The Consent holder shall ensure that all adjacent areas (except the carriageway if open for vehicular use) to a distance of 10 metres be kept free of litter and refuse at all times whilst on site.
- 12. Authorised vehicles must be roadworthy, have current relevant documentation and internal and external appearance of vehicles &/or stalls shall be maintained in a clean, neat and tidy condition.
- 13. Any stall or vehicle used for street trading must be immediately removable at all times in the event of an emergency, or at any other time, be removed at the request of any officers of the emergency services or officer of the Council.
- 14. The name and address of the operator and other address at which the stall or authorised vehicle is normally kept or garaged must be conspicuously and legibly displayed upon it in a place where the public may readily view it.
- 15. No stall or vehicle shall remain situated for longer than one hour after the authorised trading time(s).

- 16. No Consent holder shall trade at his / her authorised location on dates when road closure directives are in place for special events otherwise than with the permission of the organisation applying for same.
- 17. The Consent is non-transferable.
- 18. Where a structure or vehicle is not removed at the end of trading, no additional permanent or semi-permanent additions or paving shall be erected or constructed adjacent to the structure or vehicle.

Note: Failure to comply with any conditions attached to the Consent may result in the revocation of such consent.

The issuing of a street trading consent does not confer a right to use any street, highway or land. Applicants should satisfy themselves that all other necessary permissions for the activity of street trading (e.g. Landowner's permission, planning permission, Highways Authority consent) are in place where applicable.

Dear Sirs,

Renewed Street Trading Consent for Kebab/ Burger Van in Cranleigh, outside Post Office

My husband and I have been successfully operating a Bed and Breakfast in Cranleigh for three years. Our guests are mainly families visiting relatives in Cranleigh and they usually eat in the village in the evening at least once during their stay. Our guests are very complimentary about the village shopping, arts and restaurant experience and repeatedly return.

However, I have already had guests comment derogatively about the kebab van outside the Post Office. 'Not in keeping with the village' they say, as well as commenting on the litter around the van and the smell of chips and fat. I reassured them that the license was only temporary, and it would be unlikely to be renewed judging by residents' unhappiness with the van.

However, I notice that renewed consent has been applied for and I would like to register my strong objection. Cranleigh is extremely well served for eateries well into the night and there is no additional demand for such a van. Indeed, the economic climate has declined so much over the past year that our restaurants, pubs and cafes are already suffering. There is a risk that yet another café closes — we have seen both Maddalena's and Truffles close in the past year and others have too many empty tables. There is a risk that the High Street will lose its popularity as a destination for visitors who will choose to visit Horsham or Guildford instead.

I have also noted that the van is not well used judging by the times of night I have passed by. Indeed although they have a full week temporary license they have taken to positioning their van only on Fridays and Saturdays. Unfortunately, these nights are also likely to be more important to the direct competition in the High Street such as takeaways Subway and Seafare who both open late for pub leavers. And both of whom pay business rates unlike the Kebab/ Burger Van.

Cranleigh Village has been a quiet village in the evenings with families strolling to restaurants and pubs. Recently we have been experiencing some vandalism in the evenings – namely pellets being fired through shop windows, cars revving up unnecessarily and doing donuts. Indeed, last week one of our younger guests, a 23-year-old woman, was verbally assaulted by youths out of a passing car as she approached the ASK restaurant just opposite the Post Office. I believe that the presence of a scruffy kebab van will act as a point focus for such activity and may have done so in this case.
